## CHRISTMAS MESSAGE OF HIS LORDSHIP, MOST REV. PETER EBERE OKPALEKE, BISHOP OF EKWULOBIA

## "GLORY TO GOD ... ON EARTH PEACE TO MEN OF GOOD WILL." (Lk. 2: 14)
